with services and employers. Doranta found the one-on-one counseling to be most helpful. The counselors can help direct you to the most appropriate resources. They can also help you understand how your benefits might be impacted and help you make a plan to protect them. Latitia received help with reasonable accommodations so that she was able to do her treatment and keep her job. Artemeshia's counselor roleplayed interviews with her, which helped her to know she could physically get through it.

Gainful Employment

Employment is more than just a job. Working is a part of how we define ourselves in our family, among our friends, and within our community. There are many benefits people with renal disease get from working.

- Dialysis patients who work do a lot better physically, emotionally, financially, and socially.
- Working patients have fewer urgent care needs and are generally less stressed and depressed.
- Working patients are better off financially. People on Social Security Disability Income (SSDI) receive a small fraction of their previous income. Those who receive Supplemental Security Income (SSI) only get enough cash to help meet basic needs for food, clothing, and shelter.

In-center hemodialysis is the least "work friendly" option for dialysis. Because of the difficulty of juggling work and the dialysis schedule, it's not surprising that people quit their jobs or take paid or unpaid leave. Here are some tips to help you keep or access employment:

- Explore home dialysis options. It offers flexibility. Studies show that patients who do home dialysis have fewer complications, are healthier, enjoy fewer diet restrictions, and have a greater quality of life.
- When looking into work options, consider making your FIRST stop the Ticket to Work Program. Counselors are able to explain how the income/budget formula works, how it affects your benefits, what work-related expenses might be excluded from your income, and how to maximize your benefits. They are also knowledgeable about other Social Security work incentive programs. Speak to a counselor by calling the Help Line at 1-866-968-7842 or 1-866-833-2967 (TTY). - Now is as good a time as any to pursue a degree. Whether you want to finish high school, get a college degree, or retrain for employment, the time you spend on dialysis makes for great study time!
